
Death has touched several families – and all our congregation – within the last month. How wonderful the message that those who depart this life trusting in the Savior's work for sinners live forever!

<u>LADIES FELLOWSHIP GROUP</u> At our meeting in March we were able to discuss more about where we would send our mission offerings from 2018. We sent mission offerings to the Hmong Outreach in Vietnam, to the new mission Living Hope Lutheran Church in Chattanooga, TN (where Pastor Eric Melso is now pastor), and used other mission offerings to do work in our church for new kitchen flooring. We also made many beautiful and unique cards for sending to our shut-ins and

hospitalized members.

## CHURCH COUNCIL REPORTS

**PASTOR'S REPORT** – There are two eighth grade students in the Catechism Class (along with two seventh grade students). The class is on track to finish the material, as well as get our 8th Grade review sessions in, before Confirmation Sunday on May 5. I expect Breanna Arntson and Sophia Staffeld to present themselves for reception into communicant membership.

**WELS news** - CMO receipts through the end of February across WELS have been strong. More than \$2,664,000 has been received in CMO (compared to \$2,500,000 at the same time in 2018), and that amount is nearly \$130,000 ahead of pro-rated subscriptions by WELS congregations for 2019. Michigan District congregations have submitted \$284,000 of that \$2.65 million (compared to \$277,000 through February in 2018), which is nearly \$45,000 above pro-rated subscriptions by Michigan District congregations. We thank the Lord for this good news, and pray to Him that CMO thankofferings will continue to be strong.

The WELS Hymnal Committee hopes to have a new hymnal ready for use some time in 2021. I haven't yet heard the cost for the new hymnal, and it might be some time before a cost is determined and announced. It sounds like there will be options for printed copies and digital files to be downloaded by worshipers on mobile devices.

Although a lot of details remain for the WELS Hymnal Committee, I'll begin discussing with the Board of Elders setting up a special Hymnal Fund here. That's what we did in 1994 when the hymnals we are using now were ordered. Much of the cost was covered by gifts to such a special fund.

**BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION** – **Enrollment** is (34) - Preschool: 5; Kindergarten: 9 (up 1 for the balance of the school year); Grades 1-5: 20.

**School Promotion:** Laurie Voss updated our Facebook pages for our Pre-school and Kindergarten roundups. Invitations for Preschool and Kindergarten roundups were prepared and distributed.

**Classroom Grades 1-5**: The MLS Recruitment Coordinator was here March 11. Judy will administer ACT tests the week of April 22.

Classrooms Pre-school and Kindergarten: We have applied for our 2-year pre-school license. \$290.00 was requested from the General Fund for the Environmental Health Inspection. We await required inspections from the state. Karla met with the board to discuss how she would teach grade 1 and kindergarten and preschool, as well as having 4-day/wk. half day preschool sessions for 4 year olds. Karla has done a great job making up the preschool days lost to snow and cold.

#### **BOARD OF ELDERS** – Our voice choir resumed rehearsals March 14.

Due to health issues, our chime choir has not been rehearsing. Rehearsals will resume when everyone is healthy enough to do so.

**BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND STEWARDSHIP** – We discussed the website and updates to it. We thank Laurie Voss for her work on the web site.

We thank the members who donated two coffee makers for use in the church kitchen.

We discussed the *Opportunities to Serve* pamphlet and the updates that are being made to it.

We discussed the upcoming Holy Week and special Evangelism ideas for encouraging members to invite the unchurched to hear about the Savior with us.

We ordered 2020 thankoffering envelopes and were able to drop the *Initial Offering* envelope that asked members to contribute \$3.00 for the cost of envelopes.

**BOARD OF TRUSTEES** – Our board, Church Council, and congregation extend thanks to Katee, Howard and Sue Clark for their many years of faithful service to our congregation in their role as school custodian.

Pat Crandall is now our school custodian.

A group is looking at providing new flooring in the church kitchen and asked about the installation of the new floor over an existing drain.

Pastor and Laurie will stain the parsonage deck in early summer.

The school stage will be set up April 22 for the May 16<sup>th</sup> play productions. All gym activities will be postponed until after May 16.

## BADGER NEWS from SCHOOL

**FROM MRS. LEITZ AND PRESCHOOL-KINDERGARTEN**: This past month in our Bible lessons we have been learning about how Jesus has been preparing both Himself and the disciples for His death and resurrection. We see Jesus teaching us many important lessons even up to the time He was arrested. He taught us to serve others and not to be served, and to ask God for His will in our lives and trust that He will do what is best for us even if we don't understand it.

The preschool has started working on their numbers 1-5 in math. The threes have been working on many of their letters and are close to finishing with their letters. Then we will review them all over again before the end of the year. The fours are getting towards the end of the alphabet as well and are currently doing the story *Peter and the Wolf*.

The kindergartners have been working on adding, subtracting, measuring length and distance, telling time, and counting to twenty in math. For our Super Kids reading program the Kinders are able to read four letter words that they can sound out. They are learning the structure of writing a sentence and can write out words by listening to the sound of the letters in the word. It's a fun time of year to look back and see how far they have come! In

Social Studies we have started a unit on community. They are currently learning their own addresses and phone numbers.

We have also started working on our play "The Very Very Gingerbread Man". We hope it proves to be a very very cute and fun play!

**FROM MRS. DOMKE AND GRADES 1-5**: During March we have been studying the lessons of Jesus' passion in our Bible study class.
