What, then, shall we say in response to this? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare His own Son, but gave Him up for us all—how will He not also, along with Him, graciously give us all things? Romans 8:31-32

What are you getting at Lent?

You're likely reading these lines just before Ash Wednesday, so you're likely hearing on TV and reading in papers and on-line various stories about what some are giving *up* for Lent. But a far more important question is the one posed above: *What are you getting at Lent?* 

The idea of giving up things goes back to Bible times when people expressed sorrow for sin by fasting—going without food for a day. There is nothing wrong with that. In fact, fasting can still have the very wholesome benefit of leading a person to reflect on his guilt before the holy Lord.

But the custom was abused when people gave up—for a day, a week, a church season—some things they like, and thought they were making God more pleased with them by doing so. That situation grew worse when various church officials endorsed, then encouraged, and finally enacted the idea that a faithful member will give up something for Lent to be more right with God. Clearly, that goes against the very core of the Christian faith! Sinners are right in God's sight due to nothing they do, but only by the sacrifice of the Savior for all sinners.

That's what we are getting at Lent! The focus of our midweek services—hymns, order of service, Passion History lessons, sermons, prayers—is Christ's blood shed for us lost and condemned sinners. Rather than being deprived of anything we really like, we get even more of what we really need: the message of our trespasses and Jesus' sacrifice, of the hell we deserve and the heaven the Father opens to us. "He...did not spare His own Son, but gave Him up for us all!" Lent isn't about what we give up for God; Lent is about what God gave up for us!

In the next few days at work or during your niece's birthday party, people may talk about what they are giving up for Lent. If so, God is opening His door for you to speak about what *He has given up* for all. You can also say that—along with Jesus winning heaven for us hell-bound sinners—God "graciously gives us all things".

During Lent—or any time—it is *not* wrong to give up enjoying sweets, watching TV, going to movies, or eating red meat on Fridays. It *is* wrong, though, to think that giving up those things makes us better before God. During Lent—and all the time—God makes us rich in Jesus. We sinners hunger and thirst for every occasion to get more of our Savior in His Gospel!

See you in God's house each Sunday—and at the midweek services beginning March 1—as together we get those rich blessings from our saving Lord!

At our February meeting, we set our agenda for the year. We also chose to send our mission monies from 2016 to mission work in Hong Kong, for tuition assistance to the son of our congregation studying for the ministry at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary who is in his last few months before graduation, and to buy a matching, healthy tree for the front of church. (We will replant the western most tree.)

Our tuition assistance to the sons of our congregation who have studied for the preaching ministry has been going on since the 2002-2003 school year when studies began at Martin Luther College. We are grateful that the Lord has allowed us to help them in a small way and pray the Lord will bless their work.

We pray that the Lord will bless all mission work throughout our Synod, and that He will also bless our work as a group here at Memorial.

## CHURCH COUNCIL REPORTS

**PASTOR'S REPORT** – An Adult Instruction Class is being held at school one morning per week with a mother of two students in our preschool. If any others are interested in studying the truths of God's Word and the confessions of our church based on God's Word, I'm happy to start another class as soon as possible.

Congregation mission offerings (CMO) from across WELS for 2016 totaled \$21,059,489. That is about \$60,500 under the amount subscribed by WELS congregations for the year. That shortfall in CMO for 2016 is compounded by the fact that across WELS the congregation CMO subscriptions for 2017 are just 0.4% above last year's subscriptions.

I attended an all-day presentation last month as training was provided by the Michigan State Police (MSP) for access to the Criminal History Record Internet Subscription Service (CHRISS). This training is required for a school to have access to CHRISS, the new online system being implemented by MSP.

We thank the donors who paid for the new screen at church, and thank Howard Clark for ordering and installing the screen. It works great and is of higher quality than the one it has replaced.

**BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION** – Enrollment is 24: preschool=10; kindergarten=2; grades 1-5=12 (This is up one from prior month.)

We discussed the meeting agenda for the parent meeting regarding tuition for the 2017-2018 school year. The meeting took place on February 25.

Laurie Voss informed us about Facebook promotion options for the school site. We discussed the "boost" option for enhancing marketing. (Target people we want to reach.) Cost associated with it: you set your budget, based on who you want to reach. We also considered the "Promote your business" option. PTO would fund. We decided on this last option at \$15/day for 7 days (February 21-27, leading up to kindergarten and preschool roundup days).

The preschool license renewal will be due this spring. We have applied for same and await a visit from the state licensing personnel.

Teachers are encouraging student participation and preparation for the MLS Fine Arts Fair on March 4.

We approved dates for this summer's VBS as Monday, June 26-Thursday, June 29 at our school in the morning.

PTO purchased a new computer and software for the kindergarten room.

We reviewed the cost to purchase a new book series and other books for the school library. This will be funded by PTO.

Terra Nova testing order is on track to be placed in April.

We will ask Mrs. Bater to observe our teachers in March or April.

Upcoming events include: March 1 when PTO hosts the Ash Wednesday supper, March 4 for the MLS Fine Arts Fair in Saginaw, and March 10 for the CMLAL Choir Concert at Emanuel in Lansing.

**BOARD OF ELDERS** – The Board of Elders discussed congregational encouragement and absentee members. As the Elders continue to work on this issue, members of the congregation are strongly encouraged to reach out to those straying members with whom they may have a personal connection.

The Elders discussed Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve worship services for 2017. Since Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve fall on a Sunday in 2017, the Elders are considering having only one morning service those days along with the traditional evening services.

**BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND STEWARDSHIP** – We discussed the use of Facebook marketing for church and school during preschool and kindergarten information days.

Our website manager has found a site and set it information to view our website's analytics.

We discussed using and promoting Lenten suppers as community dinners.

Lenten suppers are as follows: March 1-PTO; March 8-BEST; March 15-Ladies Fellowship; March 22-two member families; March 29-GRAYCE; and April 5-is still open.

There will be an audit done of the church's financial records.

The WELS Connection has been renewed for 2017.

We thank Jamy Staffeld for notarizing our documents for refinancing our loan with LACE.

**BOARD OF TRUSTEES** – Our Memorial congregation work force has repaired, replaced, and or fixed: the light ballast in the school hallway, the parsonage garage door, lavatory at school, a sump pump at the church, a sump pump in the parsonage, and installed the new projector screen at church.

Our board will be going through previous years' water testing at school and those notes just for informational purposes.

A letter from the Ingham County Health Department, dated January 30, 2017, advised that we are on a schedule for a five year water test at the school, a cost of \$495.00.

We received a letter from Ingham County Health Department dated January 4, 2017 notifying us that the school will now be required to have a quarterly water test for Coliform, cost of testing is \$16.00 per test. This test was not included in the latest test from the State of Michigan DEQ.

## **BADGER NEWS from SCHOOL -**

**FROM OUR PRESCHOOL AND KINDERGARTEN ROOMS**: This past month for our Bible lessons we have been seeing Jesus preparing for His death and resurrection. We are learning how He was preparing the disciples for taking over spreading God's Word after He has died and gone to Heaven.

In preschool we have been learning classifying, and putting things in proper order. The three year olds have learned the letters C, G, O, Q, and S. The four year olds have been working on patterns, rhymes, chants, and poems and letters A-D. We also had fun celebrating Valentine's Day and going on a field trip to the MSU Rodeo.

In kindergarten we have been working on time, addition, subtraction, measuring length and width, numbers 12-14, and ordinal numbers. For Super Kids we have learned the letters E, F, H, and U. For science we have been studying about our bodies and how they work inside.

This next month we will be starting to work on our play and doing Parent/Teacher conferences. We will also be doing roundups for preschool and kindergarten right at the beginning of the month!
