"The Pharisee stood and prayed about himself: 'God, I thank You that I am not like other men—robbers, evildoers, adulterers—or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.'" "But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.'"

"I tell you that this man, rather than the other, went home justified before God. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." Luke 18:13-14

If this morning's news shows blared, "BREAKING NEWS! FOOLPROOF EBOLA VACCINE DEVELOPED!" the new medication would be the talk of the world. If this evening's newscasts led with the phrase, "ISIS forces have been completely destroyed", everyone would stop everything else and listen.

In early November four hundred ninety-seven years ago startling news was just starting to spread in Europe. "Salvation is certain in Jesus Christ!" "Forgiveness of sins need not be purchased and can not be earned; it is free in the Savior!" That wasn't a new discovery; that was the timeless truth from God. But it had been largely hidden for centuries. Luther was one of God's agents to proclaim His truth widely once again.

WELS leaders are beginning to discuss various plans for celebrating the 500th anniversary of the October 31, 1517 posting of the 95 theses. The celebration in 2017 won't be of the man God used, but of the truth God gives. That truth is summed up in the word that Luther loved and the Savior spoke in words above: *justified*.

The word comes from a Greek term for a courtroom decision rendered by a judge. God teaches us to picture His judgment as a courtroom scene. We sinners are the defendants, charged with breaking God's commandments. God is the judge, and we know that He knows and sees and hears everything. Therefore, it's foolish for us to plead "Not guilty!" We know that we're guilty, and we know that He knows that we're guilty. We are like the tax collector in our Lord's story above. But then our defense attorney, the Savior Jesus, steps forward to say, "I have paid their penalty in full by suffering hell in their place!" The Judge accepts the Savior's payment for our guilt and declares us guilty sinners, "Not guilty!" That verdict is what *justification* is all about.

Those who want nothing to do with the Savior, those who'd rather trust what they do than trust what Jesus has done—like the Pharisee in Jesus' parable, reject that verdict. They will suffer forever in hell because they didn't want the Savior's payment applied to them. But those who've been led to trust the Savior's payment live here in the joy of being fully forgiven by the work of our Brother. They will live forever in the presence of God.

This weekend's Reformation celebration, the upcoming 500th Anniversary of the Reformation, and any mention of Luther in our services and classes must keep the emphasis where God intends—and where Luther would want it. The emphasis is always on the truth that God has *justified* sinners, has declared us and the world, "Not guilty!" for the sake of Christ's work. Jesus has done everything to forgive us, to reconcile us to the holy God, to open heaven to us. May He bless our Reformation celebration of His work for us!

<u>LIVE NATIVITY UPDATE</u> This year the Live Nativity will be held **December 13 from 5:30 -7:30**. This is the week after the Williamston Light Parade. CHURCH COUNCIL REPORTS

PASTOR'S REPORT – WELS pastors received an email message from WELS President Schroeder about the benefits of WELS VEBA health insurance and options available through the Affordable Care Act (ACA). Some ACA options are cheaper for younger individuals or families, but considerably more expensive for older individual or families. Quoting a portion of President Schroeder's message: As congregations look to limit their costs, there is the potential that congregations may be tempted to discontinue participation in the WELS VEBA and send their workers to the exchanges. If a large number of congregations do this, health coverage may indeed become something that called workers are tempted to consider when deliberating a call. In addition, if enough congregations abandon WELS VEBA, and especially if they send only their younger workers to the exchanges, WELS VEBA itself may eventually be in jeopardy.

WELS VEBA remains very stable, and its rate increases for 2015 are below the increase in many other health insurance plans. The email message was sent because of a number of questions to WELS administrators and to district presidents about the implications of congregations urging called workers to pursue insurance through the exchanges.

Our district president's report at our fall pastoral conference included the concern among WELS leaders that there are already about 50 vacancies across the Synod for men with pastoral training, but in May only about 30 graduates from Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary will be available for assignment. In addition, the number of men studying on the college level for the WELS pastoral ministry is the lowest it has been since the late 1950s.

Our congregation will host the fall Northern Conference of our pastors on October 5-6, 2015.

We thank Bryan Grinnell for his time and effort to tune the piano which was moved to our church sanctuary last month.

I've spoken to Mrs. Domke about scheduling 2 (instead of the usual 3) Christmas Eve service rehearsals this December. The first rehearsal is usually poorly attended. No decision has yet been made.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION – *Mornings with Mommy* was held on September 18 and attendance was 8. The next one is scheduled for December 18.

Presently, the plan is for Mrs. Bater to teach through November 7, with Mrs. Leitz resuming her teaching duties on November 10.

Internet reliability continues to be an issue at school.

The next PTO meeting is January 21, 2015.

Mrs. Domke attended the Michigan District Teachers Conference in Bay City October 8-10.

In accordance with the emergency management plan fire, tornado and lockdown procedures and a list of drill dates were sent to Ingham County Director of Emergency Services last month.

BOARD OF ELDERS – The Board of Elders recommends the transfer of membership of Aaron Voss from Lord of Life Ev. Lutheran Church in Thornton, Colorado to our congregation.

The children and young people's group held their first meeting on September 28 with about 20 in attendance. The young people met for part of the time with Pastor Voss to make plans for future meetings, service projects, activities, worship help, and more.

Our head usher, Denis Hart, met with usher team captains and other ushers on Sunday, October 12. An emphasis at the meeting was directing and assisting communicants as they come to the communion table and return from the communion table.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND STEWARDSHIP – The board thanks the Ladies' Fellowship Group for organizing and hosting the Friendship Sunday meal and activities. *Come Follow Me* DVDs were distributed to five people at that Sunday's services.

We discussed sending a bulk mailing post card to surrounding areas to advertise our Christmas worship services and Live Nativity.

The Williamston Light Parade is Saturday, December 6. Plans are being made for our entry to have someone riding on a donkey to promote the Live Nativity which will be held the following week.

Live Nativity chairpersons met. Portions of Luke 2 and Matthew 2 will be read as people dirve and walk through the event on Saturday, December 13.

Third quarter thankoffering statements were distributed on October 11.
