"The Pharisee stood and prayed about himself: 'God, I thank You that I am not like other men – robbers, evildoers, adulterers – or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get."

"But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.""

"I tell you that this man, rather than the other, went home justified before God. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." Luke 18:13-14

If morning news shows shouted, "*Certain cure for dementia developed*!", the cure would be the talk of the world. If this evening's newcasts led with the headline, "*Michigan residents no longer required to file state income tax forms or make tax payments*!", everyone would stop everything else and listen.

In early November five hundred two years ago startling news was just starting to spread in Europe. "Salvation is certain in Jesus Christ!" "Forgiveness of sins need not be purchased and cannot be earned. It is free in the Savior!" That wasn't a new discovery. That was the timeless truth from God. But it had been largely buried for centuries. The German monk Martin Luther was one of God's agents to proclaim His truth widely once again.

The Lutheran Reformation celebration – this year on Sunday, November 3 – dare not be a celebration of the man God used. It must be a celebration of the truth God announces. That truth is summed up in the word that Luther loved and that the Savior spoke in the words reprinted above: *justified*.

The word comes from a Greek term for a courtroom decision rendered by a judge. God teaches us to picture His judgment as a courtroom scene. We sinners are the defendants, charged with breaking God's commandments. God is the judge, and we know that He knows and sees and hears everything. Therefore, it's foolish for us to plead "Not guilty!" We know we're guilty, and we know that *He* knows that we're guilty. We are like the tax collector in our Lord's story. But then our defense attorney, the Savior Jesus, steps forward to say, "I have paid their penalty in full by suffering hell in their place!" The Judge accepts the Savior's payment for our guilt and declares us admittedly guilty sinners, "Not guilty!" That verdict is what *justified* is all about.

Those who want nothing to do with the Savior, those who'd rather trust what they do than trust what Jesus has done – like the Pharisee in Jesus' parable, reject that verdict. They will suffer forever in hell because they didn't want the Savior's payment applied to them. But those who've been led to trust the Savior's payment live now in the joy of being fully forgiven by the work of our Brother. And they will live forever in the presence of God.

Our Reformation celebration and any mention of Luther in our services and classes must keep the emphasis

where God intends – and where Luther would want it. The emphasis is always on the truth that God has *justified* sinners. The praise must ever be directed to the God who has declared us and the world, "Not guilty!" for the sake of Christ's work. Jesus has done everything to forgive us, to reconcile us to the holy God, to open heaven to us. May He bless our Reformation celebration of His work for us!

CHURCH COUNCIL REPORTS



PASTOR'S REPORT – Receiving Jim & Marilyn Salter of Fowlerville into membership here via profession of faith was delayed until Sunday, October 6 due to both of them being homebound by illnesses the past two weeks. We welcome them to our midst, confident that their membership among us will be a blessing both to them and to us.

WELS news: Through the end of September, WELS CMO stands at nearly \$14,500,000 (\$14,128,000 in 2018), and still almost \$400,000 ahead of prorated CMO subscriptions for 2019. Michigan District congregations have submitted more than \$1,600,000 of that total (\$1,470,000 in 2018), and still nearly \$200,000 ahead of Michigan District prorated CMO subscriptions.

Our teachers attended the Michigan District Teachers' Conference last month in Jenera, Ohio. Both Mrs. Leitz and Mrs. Domke made presentations.

The family of the now-sainted Linda Janecke deeply appreciates all the support our members have provided these past days, as well as the efforts made by so many to provide a meal for a large crowd after Saturday's Christian Funeral service.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION – Enrollment is 29. Preschool-7; Kindergarten-3; Grades 1-5=19

Things are going well in grades 1-5.

Preschool and Kindergarten: Mrs. Leitz has changed preschool to M/Tu/Th for 3-year olds and M/Tu/W/Th for 4-year olds. This is in response to feedback from parents of 3 year olds that 3 consecutive days was too much for little ones.

Mrs. Leitz is researching the purchase of playground items using PTO funds.

There is no school on November 8 for parent/teacher conferences.

There is no school November 27-29 for Thanksgiving break.

We discussed the PTO meeting/family night from September 9.

PTO will host the Advent supper on December 4 and the Lent supper on February 26.

We are planning on additional PTO meetings in January and April.

Things are going well in Sunday School with our veteran staff. We thank them for their service!

Beginning in early November we will need volunteers for the concessions for weekend basketball games at school.

BOARD OF ELDERS – Our Thanksgiving service will be Wednesday, Nov. 27 at 7:00 PM.

As we've done the past few years, we will have only one service on Sunday, December 22 and Sunday, December 29 at 10:00 AM. There will be no Sunday School or Bible Class those Sundays.

Our voice choir began rehearsals October 17, and plans to sing for the first time during the late service on Sunday, November 3.

WELS Welcome Home Sunday is being changed from November 4 to Sunday, December 15. We will confirm the new date at our November meeting.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND STEWARDSHIP – We discussed the Trunk or Treat event planned for October 26.

We thank Terri Campbell for accepting the appointment as a thankoffering counter.

We contacted candidates for nomination to board and officer elections.

The board will ask interested members to stay after services on an upcoming Sunday to hear a presentation about - and to determine interest in - the Live Nativity for this December.

Our board hosted the first Sunday of the month refreshments on October 6 and seek volunteer hosts for future months.

We asked for Church Council input on how long giving statements should be kept by the Financial Secretary.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES – The automated door opener for the church was installed October 8.

Two sets of swings have been updated at school.

The gas main on the school roof needs to be painted.

Pat Crandall has been working on repairs to the HVAC fence and other minor repairs (sheet metal) to the HVAC at school.

We discussed possible solutions for snow shoots when the snow releases from the roof at school, for safety reasons.

FROM MRS. LEITZ AND PRESCHOOL-KINDERGARTEN: This past month has just flown by. We have been studying all about Isaac, Jacob and Joseph this month. Through them we learn to follow God's plan for us because He knows what is best for us. We also learn that God can make good come out of bad situations. If He can take away sin and death then He can help us with ANYTHING!

The Preschool and Kindergarten have been learning all of fall and fire safety this past month.
