"The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." Romans 6:23

With Labor Day this year falling as late as possible, some Lansing-area residents said in an interview that they were concerned about having less time to shop for Halloween costumes. Really?

We Lutherans always look forward to October 31, but for *spiritual* reasons. The date is the anniversary of one of Martin Luther's first public documents about some of his church's teachings. October 31, 1517 is seen by many as the beginning of the Reformation. To us, each October 31 is *first of all* Reformation Day.

Luther didn't set out to destroy his church, but to reform her wayward teachings and to urge church leaders to walk in step with God and with all His Word. His approach was not, "I believe what the church teaches", but "I believe what God teaches in His Word."

The need for a reformation—for getting people back to what God declares in His Word as the only basis for faith and life—is an ongoing need. We live in a society that desires its own set of morals and attitudes and lifestyles, rather than let God shape its morals and attitudes and lifestyles. The religious climate of our day is, "There is no absolute truth. Follow what you think is right, and all will be well between you and God!"


But how does that fit with God's truth that "the wages of sin is death"? People today take comfort in thinking that any concept of God will work for them. But the only true God says, "The gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord", the only One who could—and did!—pay the price for every sin. Without Him and without trust in Him, the sinner is condemned to hell forever.

The Biblical way of life isn't popular, nor is it politically correct. But does that give anyone the right to insist that God has it wrong, and that we need to make teachings more acceptable to others? How does it help a person to let her think that she can make up for some of her sins, or that he can trust any god that works for him?

In the opening paragraph I wasn't suggesting that you keep the kids inside your house and your porch light off the night of October 31. There's nothing wrong with dressing up in costumes (unless the costume glorifies the devil, or in some other way conflicts with Christian truth). There's nothing wrong with going to those homes where residents are willing to give treats to children.

But for us Lutheran Christians, October 31 is first of all *Reformation Day*. This year the celebration will stretch to the next day as we gather in church on November 1. Maybe you can suggest that your child to dress like a Godly character from God's Word, and be prepared to tell people on their porches why your child is dressed that way. But we all will give thanks to God for restoring His truth of His Gospel as the basis for what we believe and for how we live: freed from certain hell by Jesus and dedicated to living each moment for Him!

CHURCH COUNCIL REPORTS

PASTOR'S REPORT – Several parents who have enrolled their children for the first time in our Lutheran Elementary School have indicated at least an interest in taking the class our congregation offers for instruction about the Bible's truths as taught and confessed among us. We will send them letters of invitation.

WELS news: In mid-August a report from the WELS administration headquarter included the item that delegates at the 2015 WELS Convention approved the budget for the next 2 fiscal years as proposed by the Synodical Council. The approved budget calls for no increased synodical support for the next 2 years, wish slight increases to the overall spending made possible by the use of special funds held by the various areas of ministry.

Through the end of August, thankofferings from across the Synod for WELS work is running \$360,000 ahead of 8/12s of the subscription amounts for 2015, and about \$230,000 ahead of WELS mission offerings at the end of August in 2014.

Attendance at the midweek summer services averaged 11 this summer.

We called the Marshall Music organ technician on August 17 due to the loud popping noises and possible trouble with volume on our church organ. The technician came that same day and was able to get the popping noise to stop—"for now", he said. Should the issue arise again, he'll return to replace the amp module that he installed in early August, and do so at no charge to us.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION – *Mornings with Mommy* program is currently under review as to how it will continue going forward. Karla is considering a Saturday option.

We discussed how we will use aides for the school year given the enrollment numbers. We currently use an aide two days a week.

Family night was September 14.

The Michigan District Teachers Conference will be in St. Joseph, MI October 7-9. We will not have school on those days.

BOARD OF ELDERS – The Elders reviewed an announcement in regards to maintaining a worshipful atmosphere in the sanctuary prior to the start of service.

The Elders have been discussing having a candle lit singing of "Silent Night" for the Christmas Eve worship service.

Pastor Voss will seek to exchange pulpits with pastors from sister WELS congregations in the area for midweek Advent services.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND STEWARDSHIP – The Board of Christina Education will make an after service presentation this month.

Comcast does not provide internet service at our school location. Frontier replaced the modem; but the wireless signal is still poor.

We are planning to support a spaghetti dinner for the community. It will be held at church on Friday, November 6 from 6-8 PM. We will ask for volunteers and ask for representatives from various church groups to also attend.

Financial planning seminar will be held February 28, 2016 by Pastor Kenyon.

We thank all the families that hosted after church refreshment hours this summer.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES – A metal awning was installed on the outside of the school lobby doorway.

The dying bushes were removed and grass seed planted at school.

Thank you for the new mulch on the playground.

We will also look at replacing some of the wood/boards on the playground structure.

FROM OUR PRESCHOOL AND KINDERGARTEN ROOMS:

Preschool so far this year has been very exciting and has flown by very quickly. This year we are combining the Preschool and Kindergarten for the mornings that they are here. We have ten in all, 6 Preschoolers and 4 Kindergartners.

In Preschool we have covered the lessons of Creation and Noah's Ark in Christ Light. We have just started learning about Abraham and God's wonderful promises to him. It's such a comfort to know that God keeps the promises that He makes to us. In Kindergarten we have also covered the lessons about Cain and Abel and the tower of Babel in addition to the Preschool Christ Light lessons.

We have been doing free exploration of math manipulatives for Preschool math. We have also been learning about our wood pieces for the *Handwriting Without Tears* curriculum as well as singing many songs that go with it. We have been learning our colors and have covered the color red and just introduced the color green. Since we have many three year olds, I have decided to add a bird named Squawker to our class to help us learn new words and expand our vocabulary.

For Kindergarten math we have been doing a lot of review that the Kinders already know such as words that describe like taller and shorter, above, below, over, under, days of the week, measuring time with time of day, calendar, patterns, and right and left to name a few. We will do a bit more reviewing before getting into the new concepts. With Super Kid we have met Cass and Oswald so far and the Kinders are doing great. They are not only working on letter sounds but getting used to writing within the lines and how to correctly write each letter. In science we have been learning about the earth, sun, moon, and stars and everything in between about space. We have also started using some new instruments in music class called boom whackers. The kids are loving them!

We had our first field trip and went to The Country Mill in Charlotte! We always have so much fun there! The whole school went on this field trip.
