

MEMORIAL MESSENGER October 2016

Like newborn babies, crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation, now that you have tasted that the Lord is good. 1 Peter 2:2-3

The success movement has infiltrated the religious world. Most of our land's television evangelists and religious personalities have written books or led seminars about steps to *successful* parenting, *successful* marriages, *successful* studying, *successful* business management.

Those religious authors mean well. They intend to inject Biblical principles and spiritual goals into every facet of life. That's a wonderful idea! Unfortunately, they too often miss the main goal of God's Word and what the Lord wants to be the guiding purpose of our spiritual lives. They focus on a religious message of *glory*. They'd rather concentrate on how happy and successful God can make our lives right now. God *does* want us to be happy in life; but that isn't His main objective for us.

God wants our focus to be on what Martin Luther called *the theology of the cross*. Our Lord's plan for us starts with and stands on the foundation of what Christ's life and death and resurrection mean for us sinners who have offended God with our sins. We need to keep that in mind every time we read anything of a spiritual nature, even those materials coming from a Christian camp. We need to keep our religious diet in line with what our Lord sets before us in the verses above: His *"pure spiritual milk"*.

Did you notice God didn't suggest we simply snack on His Word? "Like newborn babies, crave pure spiritual milk." A tiny infant screams if she hasn't been fed lately; she won't be quiet or satisfied until she gets some milk. Does that describe our attitude toward God's Word? Will we refuse to start our daily routine or fall asleep at night unless we've been fed by God with His Word? With His pure Word?

The sinful nature in us snarls, "Why should I take the time to do that every day? I'm busy! And isn't this Bible stuff the same material repeated over and over again?" The voice of God Himself thunders back, "*Crave pure spiritual milk...now that you have tasted that the Lord is good.*"

If your life has had some financial, physical, or emotional setbacks lately, you might wonder if God's goodness has run dry—at least, dry in *your* direction. That's the problem with concentrating on the theology of *glory*; God has not promised us perpetual prosperity in the area of earthly wealth.

We face disappointments all the time. But when we look at disappointments through the microscope of Christ's work for us, we realize the Lord is still very good to us. None of those disappointments dilutes God's forgiveness at all. That's the beauty of seeing everything through the window of the theology of the cross; God has promised us unlimited forgiveness from the well of His grace in Christ!

As we Lutherans prepare for another Reformation season, celebrating what God did for His Church through the work of Luther, let's not forget Luther's emphasis on the cross of Jesus. There we find blessings that never run out. There we find the success that lasts forever. There we find nourishment that's always good for



After discussion at those services, the Church Council will finalize the budget it will propose to the voters for the voters meeting. An open forum will be held at 11:35 on Sunday, October 23 as reports and the proposed 2017 budget are presented for discussion. CHURCH COUNCIL REPORTS

PASTOR'S REPORT – WELS news: Congregation Mission Offerings to WELS have been running below 2015 amounts for a good portion of the summer. The mission offerings amounts that had been exceeding subscribed amounts are now behind subscribed amounts—and the subscribed amounts for 2016 are slightly less than what was promised for 2015. WELS leaders are keeping a close eye on this; the fall meeting of the Synodical Council may require action to make sure that expenses do not exceed funds available.

Attendance at the summer Monday evening worship services: 8,8,14, 7, 17, 13, 12, 4, 6. As noted in the Board of Elders report, we are seriously considering a change to Thursday evening services next summer.

I will attend our Pastor Conference in Indian River on Monday, October 3 and Tuesday, October 4. I've asked to be excused from the conference mid-afternoon Tuesday to allow me to be here for board meetings that evening.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION – Enrollment stands at 8 for preschool, 2 for kindergarten and 13 in grades 1-5.

The board reminds current parents, grandparents and members that word of mouth advertising is still our best promotional tool.

Preschool aides have been secured and are in place to serve.

There has been a lot of work done to clean out the computer room, kitchen and pantry, and mezzanine. The board thanks those that volunteered their time.

Laurie Voss has organized volunteers for the school library.

Mrs. Domke and Mrs. Leitz will attend the Michigan District Teachers Conference will be held in Livonia from October 5-7. There will be no school those days.

BOARD OF ELDERS – Further discussion was had regarding the time for the New Year's Eve service this year. Based on comments from Council last month, The Elders are considering 4:00 worship time this New Year's Eve since it falls on a Saturday.

The Elders reviewed the summer worship schedule. With holidays and other circumstance, it seems the Monday services get canceled or re-schedule more frequently than the Thursday evening services in the past. Therefore, in an effort to maintain a more consistent worship schedule, we will discuss again next month whether we should move the Monday services to Thursday evenings next summer.

Pastor Voss will contact the other area pastors to make arrangement to exchange pulpits for the upcoming midweek Advent services.

Plans to recognize Linda Janecke's 50 years of service as choir director are being made. There will be a pot luck meal and short program following worship on October 2 in the fellowship hall. BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND STEWARDSHIP – A sermon was recorded and we will be putting it on line to test with this recording.

A community dinner was set for September 23. We held a tailgate in our church parking lot before the Williamston High School football game.

We discussed candidates for open positions on boards and positions expiring. We'll post a slate by Sunday, October 6. Contacts are being made with incumbents and others for nominations to office.

We discussed putting a note in the bulletin letting members know about our Facebook page and to visit it.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES – Thank you to those who volunteered to clean the pantry, kitchen, and computer room at school. The list of projects they have will be completed.

We discussed water testing for Boron. We will incorporate this into the regular testing. The cost is approximately \$20.00 additional. We will monitor the level as needed.

FROM OUR PRESCHOOL AND KINDERGARTEN ROOMS:

We have had fun getting to know one another so far this year. We have started the school year with a good crew. We have 3 three year olds, 5 four year olds, and 2 in kindergarten this year.

For Christ Light we have been learning about Jesus' life from birth up to His Baptism.
