So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live in Him, rooted and built up in Him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness. Colossians 2:6-7

I wish we could do away with our church budget.

Like you, I realize it's necessary to adopt a budget. We need a guide for congregational expenditures. If we didn't have a budget, who would decide how much to give our called workers, school custodian, and office secretary? Who would decide what amount to send in support of our Synod's Gospel work around the world? Who would decide about every other expense for our church and school? Setting a congregational budget is a God-pleasing way to manage the blessings He gives a group of believers.

But a church budget can be misused. Our sinful nature wants to use every cent selfishly, so we're tempted to look at the church's budget and say, I'm responsible for only a small portion of that. I'll give my share and let the others come up with the rest. We have different opinions about what is important, so we're tempted to rationalize, I don't like certain portions of the church budget, so I won't contribute as much as I could. Since church leasers know what happens if budgets aren't met, they're tempted to urge members, Give more!

Compare those temptations about church budgets with the truth about salvation God gives us in the verse before us on this page. We "continue to live in" Christ, not to meet a budget. We are "rooted and built up in Him", not driven by a budget's bottom line. We are "strengthened in the faith as we were taught", not made stronger by a balanced budget. We are "overflowing with thankfulness", not guided by how much the church needs.

Our hearts are filled by the Holy Spirit with everything Christ Jesus has done for us to win our forgiveness, make us God's children, assure us of heaven. *That* is the motivation for Christian living and giving. *That* is the message God moves us to spread; it is for the continued preaching and teaching of God's Word that we bring our thankofferings to Him (not to a church). *That* is what moves us to bring God the firstfruits of our income, not the leftovers from the previous week's spending.

Our Savior tells us to bring a faithful percentage of our income each week – not because He and His Church need it, but because you and I are "overflowing with thankfulness". As we look at the third quarter thankoffering statement which will be placed in our mail slots this month, we'll evaluate how our thankofferings reflect our love for our Savior and His work to redeem us sinners.

In the weeks ahead (and for the rest of our lives), we won't look at the church budget to determine how much we should offer. We will look at the Savior's cross to see the full extent of His love that saves us. We will look at the Lord's world to see billions of people who still need to hear of His saving work. We will look at God's promises that He will continue to provide for us to silence Satan's whispers that we can't afford to put anything



WELS news Through the end of August, WELS CMO stands at nearly \$12,851,000 (\$12,616,500 in 2018), almost \$400,000 ahead of prorated CMO subscriptions for 2019. Michigan District congregations have submitted more than \$1,415,000 of that total (\$1,300,000 in 2018), nearly \$200,000 ahead of Michigan District prorated CMO subscriptions. We thank God for that good news!

However, WELS officials are concerned about WELS CMO not even covering the cost of inflation. At a time when the Savior is opening doors for mission work in parts of the world where WELS hasn't been doing work, it will be disappointing if WELS is not only unable to enter those mission fields, but also must cut some work currently being done. Please keep this matter in your prayers to the Lord of the Church.

Our teachers will attend the Michigan District Teachers' Conference October 9-11 in Jenera, Ohio.

I conducted the memorial service Saturday to comfort the family and friends of WELS member Helen Haslam, mother of Karen Collins. The family deeply appreciates the meal prepared by members of our congregation following that service.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION – Enrollment (30) Pre-school 3-year olds – 4; Pre-school 4-year olds – 3; Kindergarten – 3; Grades 1-5 – 20 (1st – 8; 2nd – 5; 3rd – 2; 4th – 3; 5th – 2)

School Promotion Discussed ideas for banners and yard signs, verbiage etc.

Classroom Grades 1-5 Computer purchased through PTO for smartboard. ACT test scores are in for grades 3-5, and are being reviewed.

Classroom Pre-school and Kindergarten Will have an aide serve for 3 mornings plus a little bit on a 4th morning per week. Discussed purchase of playground items with PTO funds.

General School items Library helpers are in place. New families are adjusting well. Mrs. Chaffee will teach art again this year. Mr. Ostrander will teach gym class again this year. Special monthly hot lunch organizers from last year will do the same this year.

The Elders will ask our members to encourage others within our congregation with whom they have a relationship with and have been absent from worship.

A large gift was received for the Hymnal Fund. It is the hope of the donor the gift be used for hymnals, as well as appropriate organ and HymnSoft materials and/or a bigger computer table.

We will be participating with the WELS Welcome Home Sunday plan. Our Welcome Home Sunday is tentatively set for Nov. 3.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND STEWARDSHIP – Discussed the Trunk or Treat that is planned for Saturday, October 26th from 2:00 – 4:00 in the church parking lot.

We thank all the hosts of the summer refreshment hours.

We finalized plans for the September 8th church picnic.

After-service Presentation this quarter will be done by the Board of Christian Education.

The board looked at the 10-For-10 stewardship emphasis materials from WELS. We will likely use them early in 2020.

We will discuss with the congregation the feasibility of having the Live Nativity.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES – The lease agreement between Little Leap and Memorial has been signed and executed.

FROM MRS. LEITZ AND PRESCHOOL-KINDERGARTEN: We have a great group of ten little ones this year. Some are new and some are familiar faces. We have now started to get our rhythm as a group and are well on our way to a great year!

For our Bible lessons we have been learning about the creation of the world, Noah and the flood, and Abraham. Through all of this the main theme has been that God keeps His promises to us! We want to trust in Him just as Noah and Abraham did, and we can because we know He kept His promise of sending the Savior.

Our threes have been working on recognizing the letters in their names, counting by pointing at objects, holding their crayons correctly, and cutting skills.

The fours have been working on letters A-D, counting and matching numbers, and position words like right, left, over and under.

The kindergartners have been working on letter C, O, and G. They have been learning position words, writing numbers 1-5, and making patterns for math. In science we have been learning all about animals and their habitats.

We have been learning about apples and how they grow. Next month we will talk about fall and how pumpkins grow. We visited the Country Mill apple orchard to learn about apples growing and how they make all the yummy apple treats. The students get to pick an apple and a pumpkin and get to ride in a wagon. We hope to have the fire department visit next month with fire prevention month.

FROM MRS. DOMKE AND GRADES 1-5: Grades 1-5 are off to a great start! I have nineteen students, all eager to learn, play and work hard. We are in a good groove already and I know we are going to have a fantastic year.

We are studying the Old Testament this year in our Bible study. We have covered creation, the fall, the first promise, the tower of Babel, the flood, and now we will are beginning a rather long series of lessons about Abraham. It is the greatest honor to share with little people the truths of God's Word! It is wonderful to hear them share those truths, too.

The third, fourth and fifth graders are learning about physical science this year. Next week we will be starting a rather long experiment involving the scientific method.
